




PRAYER BOOK

The Liturgical Year



<u>Advent</u>

Begins four Sundays prior to Christmas. Includes all days until Christmas (or Christmas Eve). The length varies according to date of first Sunday.

The beginning of the Christian year.

Themes: Waiting; Expectation; Hope; Yearning; Our need for a Saviour.

The liturgical colours of Advent are Purple and Rose, with Rose being used only on the third Sunday of Advent.

<u>Christmas</u>

December 25th through January 5, a twelve-day season.

Many Christians begin celebrating Christmas on Christmas Eve. Of course most people think of Christmas as a day, not a season.

Themes: Celebration of the Incarnation of the Word of God; Salvation; Joy; Kingdom; Peace; Giving.

The liturgical colour of Christmas is white.

Epiphany

January 6, the day after the season of Christmas.

Themes: Some traditions emphasise the visit of the Magi (Wise Men) and the universal import of salvation in Christ. Other traditions focus on the baptism of Jesus.

Ordinary Time

When: Times during the year when there is not a special day or season.

Ordinary time begins the day after Epiphany and extends until the day before Lent.

Ordinary time begins again after Pentecost, extending until the day before Advent.

Themes: Ordinary time is not "plain, boring time," but rather "counted" time. Different traditions include many celebrations during ordinary time, such as Trinity Sunday, Christ the King Sunday, All Saints Day, and so forth. The themes of ordinary time include the basic elements of the Christian life.

The liturgical colour of Ordinary Time is green; however, as in all seasons, other appropriate colours are worn on particular feast days. (*For example, blue is typically worn for Marian feast days.*)

<u>Lent</u>

Forty weekdays prior to Easter, beginning with Ash Wednesday.

The precise dates vary according to the date of Easter, which can range from March 22 to April 25. The six Sundays during the season of Lent are not counted in the forty days. Themes: Penitence; Morality; Human Limitations; Need for a Saviour; Self-Denial; Preparation for Good Friday and Easter.

Holy Week

The last seven days of Lent, prior to Easter. Holy Week includes: Palm Sunday (Passion Sunday), Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday.

Themes: The last week of Jesus' life; The death of Jesus and its meaning; Love for one another (Maundy Thursday). Palm Sunday celebrates Jesus and king, but leads into a solemn preparation for remembrance of his death.

The liturgical colours of Lent are violet or purple. On Palm Sunday and on Good Friday (which has no Mass but a service remembering Christ's passion) the colour is red. White or violet is

worn on Holy Thursday and Holy Saturday (once again, there is no Mass but there are other services on Holy Saturday).

<u>Easter</u>

A fifty-day season of the year, beginning on the evening before Easter and continuing for seven Sundays until Pentecost. Includes Ascension Day. Easter Sunday or Resurrection Day is celebrated on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Spring equinox (March 21). Themes: Salvation; Victory; New life; Joy; Christ reigns.

The liturgical colours of Easter are white, for most days.

Pentecost

The seventh Sunday after Easter.

Themes: The outpouring of the Holy Spirit; The birth of the church; Power for service in the church and the world; The inclusion of all of God's people in ministry. "Pentecost" comes from the Greek word for fifty, from the phrase "fiftieth day [after Easter]." In some traditions it is called Whitsunday (White Sunday), perhaps owing to the white garments of those baptised on this Sunday.

The liturgical colour for Pentecost is red.

Ordinary Time (again)

From the day after Pentecost through the day before Advent, about five months. The liturgical colour of Ordinary Time is green; however, as in all seasons, other appropriate colours are worn on particular feast days.

Basic Rosary Guide How To Say the Rosary and Use Rosary Beads

- 1. At the crucifix, begin with the Sign of the Cross
- 2. On the first large bead say the Our Father prayer
- 3. Followed by three Hail Mary prayers
- 4. Then say one Glory Be prayer

Now you are at the medal that joins the beads.

Then announce the first Joyful, Luminous, Sorrowful or Glorious Mystery depending upon what mysteries you are meditating on this particular day.

- 5. Then begin the decade with one Our Father all the while keeping hold of the medal.
- 6. On the ten small beads that follow pray ten Hail Marys.
- 7. Followed by one Glory Be Prayer. Then the Fatima Prayer. O my Jesus, forgive us our sins. Save us from the fires of hell, lead all souls to heaven especially those in most need of Thy mercy.
- 8. When you come to the large bead, announce the second respective mystery, then pray one Our Father.
- 9. On the ten small beads pray another set of ten Hail Marys followed by one Glory Be and the Fatima Prayer called a decade, as before.
- 10. Continue this pattern of announcing the mystery and praying a decade. Do this for the third, fourth and fifth mystery consecutively followed by one Our Father, ten Hail Marys, one Glory Be and the Fatima Prayer.
- 11. After the fifth and final decade has been prayed, after the Fatima Prayer, pray the <u>Hail Holy Queen</u> <u>prayer</u>. Hail, Holy Queen, Mother of Mercy, our life, our sweetness and our hope, to thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve; to thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this vale of tears; turn, then most gracious Advocate, thine eyes of mercy towards us, and after this, our exile, show unto us the blessed fruit of thy womb Jesus. O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary! Pray for us, O holy Mother of God, that we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.
- 12. It is customary to finish the Rosary prayers with the <u>"Let us Pray" prayer</u> from the Breviary Let us pray, O God, whose only begotten Son, by His life, death and Resurrection, has purchased for us the reward of eternal salvation. Grant we beseech Thee that while meditating upon these mysteries of the most Holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary, we may imitate what they contain and obtain what they promise through the same Christ our Lord. Amen. Followed by the <u>Saint Michael Prayer</u>. Saint Michael the Archangel, defend us in the day of battle. Be our safeguard against the wickedness and the snares of the devil. May God rebuke him we humbly pray and do thou O Prince of the Heavenly Host, by the power of God, cast into hell Satan and all the evil spirits who prowl throughout the world seeking the ruin of souls.
- 13. Now just as you began, end with the Sign of the Cross.

The Stations of the Cross

FIRST STATION Jesus Is Condemned to Death

DEAR JESUS, there You stand a prisoner and wicked men have said that You must die. But You have done nothing wrong. You have spent Your whole life in doing good to others. I must always remember that it was for me You died so that I could go to Heaven and be happy with You. Teach me, dear Jesus when I am blamed for something even if unjustly to be silent as You were because I love You and want to be like You.

SECOND STATION Jesus Is Made to Carry His Cross

DEAR JESUS, the cross which they are laying on Your shoulders is so heavy how it must hurt! And You are all wounded and bleeding how will You be able to carry it up that steep hill? **Teach me to remember that when I sin it hurts You even more than the heavy cross.**

THIRD STATION Jesus Falls the First Time

DEAR JESUS, You are so weak and tired that You can hardly walk but the soldiers roughly order You to start on Your journey. After a few steps You stumble and fall but there is no one to help You or speak to You kindly. .How I wish I could have been there to tell You that I love You and was so sorry for You.

Teach me to take every opportunity to let others know that I love them.

FOURTH STATION Jesus Meets His Blessed Mother

DEAR JESUS, who is this waiting for You standing close to the place where you must pass? It is Your own Blessed Mother who loves You so much. But how it hurts her to see You so cruelly treated. She wishes they would do all these things to her instead of to You. The soldiers will not let her say a word she can only speak to You with her eyes as You pass by. **Teach me to love Your Blessed Mother very much.**

FIFTH STATION Simon of Cyrene Helps Jesus to Carry the Cross

DEAR JESUS, You are now so weak that You cannot carry the cross alone any more. The soldiers make a man named Simon help You with it. I wish I had been Simon so that I could have helped You.

Teach me to remember that I am helping You even more now when I show kindness to others / for Your sake.

SIXTH STATION Veronica Wipes the Face of Jesus

DEAR JESUS, Your face was all covered with dust and blood and the wicked people had been spitting on it. The blood was trickling down from the crown of thorns on Your head right into Your eyes when St. Veronica pushed her way through the crowd and wiped Your face with her veil. To thank her for being so brave You left the picture of Your face there on the veil.

Teach me to remember that I must never be afraid to say I belong to You and am Your child.

SEVENTH STATION Jesus Falls the Second Time

DEAR JESUS, this time You fall more heavily than before and it is harder to get up. The soldiers push and strike You to make You hurry along when You can hardly walk. It frightens me to think how cruelly You are treated, You Who are my Lord and my God.

Teach me to understand what a dreadful thing sin is because to pay for it You suffered so much.

EIGHTH STATION Jesus Speaks to the Women of Jerusalem.

DEAR JESUS, there are some women waiting by the roadside to see You pass. They are so sorry for You that they are crying. You speak to them kindly and tell them not to weep for You but for themselves and their children because many people are going to suffer terribly as a punishment for not having believed in You.

Teach me to be very sorry for my sins / not for fear of being punished for them / but because they hurt You.

NINTH STATION Jesus Falls the Third Time

DEAR JESUS, for the last time You stumble and fall to the ground. Shall You ever be able to get up again? The cross crushes You with its weight and the people around wonder if You are not dead already. But no once more You climb to Your feet and struggle forward up the hill. **Teach me never to be discouraged even if I keep falling into the same sins but help me to begin again, at once, to obey You and to do Your will.**

TENTH STATION Jesus Is Stripped of His Garments

DEAR JESUS, at last You have reached the top of the hill the place where You are to die. There is a big crowd of people around You, they are laughing at You and calling You wicked names. Your dear Mother and Your friends cannot get near. The executioner roughly pulls off all Your garments and the blood pours down. All the people are looking at You.

Teach me to be willing sometimes to give up little pleasures and go without things that I want because You suffered so much for me.

ELEVENTH STATION Jesus Is Nailed to the Cross

DEAR JESUS, now they are putting big nails through Your hands and feet to fasten You to the cross. It hurts me only to prick my finger with a pin. How much more those nails must hurt You! When the executioner tells You stretch out Your hand or Your foot You obey him without saying a word. And I when I am told to do some little, easy thing how often I disobey!

Teach me to be always perfectly obedient because You were so obedient when being nailed to the cross.

TWELFTH STATION Jesus Dies on the Cross

DEAR JESUS, You are hanging on the cross and dying. You are dying for me so that I can be God's child and go to Heaven. You are not angry with the wicked men who killed You. You have forgiven them and You asked Your Father to forgive them, too. The people are all going away. I think some of them are beginning to be sorry. Your Blessed Mother and Your friends are standing close by the cross. I wish I had been with them. I would have stayed there to the very end to show how much I love You.

Teach me always to forgive anyone who is unkind to me because You forgave Your murderers when You hung dying on the cross.

THIRTEENTH STATION Jesus Is Taken Down from the Cross

DEAR JESUS, it is very quiet now around the cross. Everybody has gone away but a few soldiers and Your Mother and Your friends. Two of Your friends bring a ladder and oh, so slowly and carefully they take You down and lay You in the arms of Your Blessed Mother. Her heart is breaking as she looks at the crown of thorns and the nails and all Your dreadful wounds. **Teach me to comfort Your dear Mother now by never hurting You with my sins.**

FOURTEENTH STATION Jesus Is Laid in the Tomb

DEAR JESUS, You are all ready to be laid in the tomb. Your wounds have been washed and You are wrapped in clean white linen cloths. You must be buried tonight. In a garden close by which belongs to one of Your friends there is a new tomb cut in the rock. Now, You are being carried there. Your Blessed Mother looks at You for the last time how can she bear to let You go? But in three days, dear Jesus You will rise from the dead all bright and glorious to go back to Heaven never to suffer any more.

Teach me, among the joys of earth / always to remember the joys of Heaven. Help me to love You so much that, when I die I shall be happy with You there forever.

Dedication for September:

The Seven Sorrows

Liturgical Colours:

Ordinary Time: Green

During September we reflect on the seven sorrows of Mary:

- 1. Prophecy of Simeon.
- 2. Flight into Egypt.
- 3. Lost in the Temple.
- 4. Meeting on the Way of the Cross.
- 5. Crucifixion.
- 6. Taking down from the Cross.
- 7. Burial.

These saints have their feast days in September:

St. Matthew	21 st September
St. Vincent de Paul	27 th September
Feast of the Archangels	29 th September
St. Jerome	30 th September

29th September ~ Feast of the Archangels (Michaelmas)

Angels are signs of God's care and love. They remind us how God knows each of us. When we say the Nicene Creed, we say we believe in one God 'maker of all that is seen and unseen.' God created the angels, whether we see them or not, and they are most wondrous to contemplate! There are nine classes of angels (Colossians 1:16 and Romans 8:38). Archangels are one of these. Three archangels are named in the Bible: Michael, Gabriel and Raphael. These are the three we celebrate on this day.

The Archangel Gabriel

The word angel means 'messenger' and Gabriel is the archangel who brought very important messages from God. We learn of him in the Old Testament book of Daniel. In the New Testament, Gabriel came to Zechariah to tell him of the child, John the Baptist that Zechariah and Elizabeth would have. Of course, it was Gabriel who came to Mary asking her to be the Mother of God. Tradition also suggests that Gabriel will sound the trumpet on the day of judgement, calling all people from all times and places. The name Gabriel means 'God is my strength.'



Prayer to Archangel Gabriel

Please grant me the wisdom of understanding and the ability to communicate with others heart to heart.

The Archangel Raphael

Raphael only appears in once in the Bible in the Book of Tobit in the Old Testament. His is a wonderful story of guidance, healing and love. In the Gospel of John, in the story of the healing pool where Jesus heals a man, tradition says that it was Raphael who stirred the waters.



Prayer to Archangel Raphael

Please help me to surrender myself, body and soul, to your healing. I accept healing in every part of me.

The Archangel Michael

In the Old Testament, Michael is described as standing guard over God's people. The Book of Revelation tells how Michael cast the angels who thought they were like God, out of Heaven. The name Michael means 'Who is like God?' Michael is thought of as a great protector, and is often shown dressed in armour. As Michael fights against evil, his feast day offers images of good versus evil.

The Advent Wreath

The use of the Advent wreath with four candles has been and Advent ritual for hundreds of years. The Advent wreath is a symbol of the four week wait for Jesus' birth. The evergreen leaves remind us of the new life we have in Jesus, the circle represents the eternity of God's love and the candles represent the light and hope Jesus brings into the world.

Prayer for Week 1

As we light the first candle on our Advent wreath, we start our holy path to Christmas. We give thanks to God for all the good things in our lives, especially the love of our family and friends. We are happy to share God's love with others while we prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus, God's son. We ask you to help us stay on the Advent path and keep our hearts focused on Jesus as we prepare for Christmas. Amen.

Prayer for Week 2

Mary and Joseph were people of great love. They were chosen to be the parents of Jesus because of their love for God. We are thankful to have their obedience, kindness and deep faith as our examples. As we travel on our Advent path and light the second candle, we pray that we too will love God as much as Mary and Joseph.

Prayer for Week 3

The journey to Bethlehem must have been very hard for Mary and Joseph. A long donkey ride of a rough path must have seemed to go on forever, but Mary and Joseph trusted God and knew that God would be there to take care of them. We are so thankful that God is always here for us, during good times and bad. We remember this when we light the third candle. As we continue on the Advent path we ask God to be with us in all we do each day. Amen.

<u>Prayer for Week 4</u>

How excited Mary and Joseph must have been as the day of Jesus' birth grew closer! Their hearts must have been full of joy and thanksgiving. As we light the fourth candle and Christmas Day comes closer, we too have become more excited and joyful. Be with is, loving God, and help us continue to keep Jesus in our hearts as our Advent path takes us closer to Christmas. Amen.

The first observance of Christmas in December was recorded on a Roman calendar around 336AD. It is believed that Christmas customs and celebrations grew out of harvest celebrations held in December. The end of the harvest was marked with special foods, decorations, singing and gift-giving and these developed into the Christmas traditions we know today.

<u>Christmas Eve Prayer</u>

Thank you, Lord, for sending us you son, Jesus, who gives us light and hope in the days ahead. We ask that you guide our family and help them to reflect the Holy Family in all we say and do, each and every day. Amen.

Luke 2:29-30

The Presentation of the Lord is the story of Jesus being brought to the temple in Jerusalem. According to Jewish law a woman whose firstborn was a son was to stay in seclusion for forty days after giving birth. Parents then brought their children to the temple to be blessed. Mary and Joseph brought Jesus to the temple in Jerusalem. The highlight of this visit to the temple was meeting Simeon, who was a very devout Jew. Simeon had prayed that he would not die without seeing the Messiah. As Mary and Joseph arrived at the temple, Simeon was filled with the Spirit. He took Jesus in his arms, blessed him and proclaimed that this was truly the Son of God. This feast is also called Candlemas. Since the seventh century there has been a tradition of blessing candles before Mass on this day and giving them to people to use throughout the year.

Jesus, you are the Light of the World. We know that you are the Good News of love and hope in our lives. We know that your light and love will get us through any difficult or dark times. Be with us. In your name we pray. Amen.

Lent

Around 400AD, the Christian church formally established the season of Lent. The word 'Lent' means 'lengthen' and it is an old English word for spring. In spring the days grow longer, brighter and warmer, and we experience new life everywhere in nature. What a great connection to the life we have in Jesus.

Early Christians were very repentant during Lent. People were sombre, strictly fasted for the whole forty days and even wore a rough fabric called sackcloth. Today we try to become better people and grow closer to Jesus by giving up negative habits and taking on positive ones.

Palm Sunday

'Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest!' Matthew 21:9

On Palm Sunday we remember when Jesus arrived in the city of Jerusalem. Many people loved Jesus. When he came to the city, they were very excited. He rode in on a donkey, and many went to greet him. They shouted, 'Hosanna! Hosanna!' as they God for all the wonderful things Jesus had done. They waved branches taken from trees to show honour and respect for Jesus. They lined the streets with their cloaks.

<u>Prayer</u>

Dear Jesus, today we remember your humble but triumphant entrance into Jerusalem. You truly are the Son of God, the Messiah. We will keep you in our hearts this week as we remember your Holy Week journey so many years ago. Hosanna! Hosanna to Jesus our King! Amen.

Holy Week

The week leading up to Easter is the richest time of the year for Christians. It is filled with symbols of triumph, tragedy, fear, and incredible love.

Maundy Thursday

We remember the special Passover meal that Jesus shared with his special friends. Jesus knew that he would soon die and he wanted to show his friends how much he loved them. Jesus also wanted to teach each of them how they were to treat others. So, at dinner, he took a bowl of water and a towel and he washed their feet. You seek Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has risen, he is not here, see the place where they laid him. But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going before you to Galilee; there you will see him, as he told you.' Mark 16: 5-7

Easter is the holiest of all days for Christians. It is the time we celebrate the new life we have in Jesus, Son of God, who died and three days later rose from the dead. The gift of hope and life after death is the eternal message of the day. What a sacrifice Jesus made for each of us!

<u>Prayer</u>

Alleluia! Alleluia! Christ has risen! What a wonderful day this is! On this Easter day we celebrate with joy and hope in our hearts. Jesus our Lord has risen! Be with us today, Lord Jesus, as we celebrate the Good News of Easter. Amen.



The Sacred Heart of Jesus is a symbol to help us understand that Jesus has a tremendous love for us.

It also helps us to remember that Jesus is human as well as being God. It was during the years 800 – 1000 that devotion to the Sacred Heart began although the rewards of devotion to the Sacred Heart were only revealed during the 17th century to Margaret Mary Alacoque.

Jeremiah 31: 31-34 helps to explain this devotion: 'The human heart, a person's deepest self, is where God has written his covenant.'

June 29th ~ St Peter and St. Paul

Many people have helped spread the Good News of Jesus but these two saints were among the very first and are sometimes called the 'architects' of our faith.

St. Peter was a fisherman who followed Jesus, learned from him and loved him. After Jesus was gone from Earth, the other apostles saw him as their leader. Like us, he did not always find it easy to follow Jesus and denied him three times when he was arrested after the Last Supper.

St. Paul had more education than Peter and he never met Jesus. At first he persecuted Christians but with God's help he changed his mind. He then became a great teacher and organiser of Christian groups.

Although they were very different men and had different experiences of Jesus, they both used their talents and energy to bring the Good News of Jesus to many in the world.

6th August ~ Feast of the Transfiguration

Peter, James and John witnessed the transfiguration or presentation of the diving glory of Christ. It is believed that Christ wanted to strengthen the faith of the Apostles before his death, so that they would know him when he returned. Through this amazing revelation, we recognise Jesus' divinity and hope for our own glory.

15th August ~ Feast of the Assumption

'My being proclaims the greatness of the Lord, My spirit finds joy in God my saviour.' Luke 1:46



The assumption of Mary is the day we remember the ascension of Mary, body and soul to heaven. The belief of people ascending into heaven is part of both the Christian and Jewish tradition. In 1915 Pope Pius XII proclaimed the Assumption of Mary as official church doctrine. It is a holy day of obligation.
