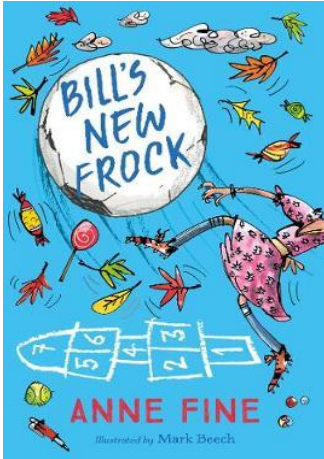

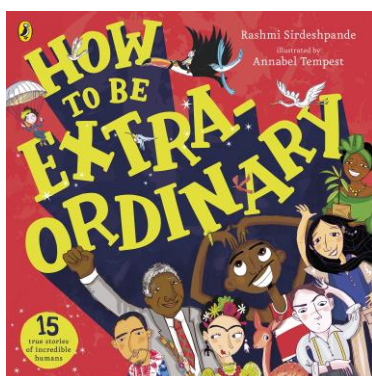
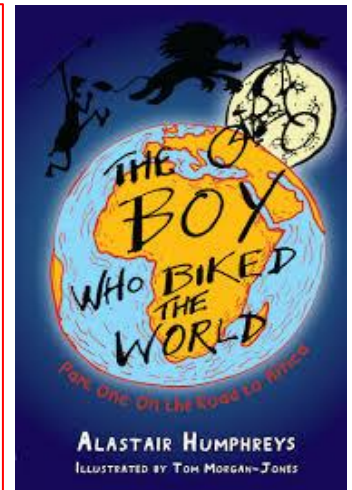


Bill's New Frock- Anne Fine

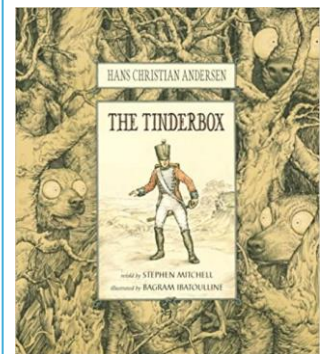
A bit of non-fiction...
